#### **Musical Notes**

# *Our Music Director, Michael Turner, shares some thoughts about tonight's programme.*


Nonsense poetry and writing is such fun. In one respect you can just "go with the flow" in terms of the streams of consciousness coming from the writers while, in another, you can expend energy trying to reach and understand a deeper meaning contained within the text. The choice is yours.

The first piece tonight is a collection of five nonsense settings that I've produced over several years that are being performed together for the first time this evening under the title *Stuff and Nonsense*. Edward Lear is well known for his nonsense writing but, perhaps surprisingly, A E Housman puts in an appearance. *The Crocodile* is conceivably more silly than nonsensical, nevertheless its daftness is in significant contrast to poet's most well-known output which is often dark and serious. I've also included two anonymous texts. *I Saw a Peacock* was new to me when I set it, while *Hey Diddle Diddle* takes me back to my childhood - we had a puzzle featuring all the key characters in the poem.

Bob Chilcott, who celebrates his 70<sup>th</sup> Birthday this year, is well established as one of the most prolific and engaging British composers of vocal music. His version of *The Twelve Days of Christmas* is a masterpiece of choral writing, making references to a wide range of musical styles along the way, while his *A Little Jazz Mass* has quickly become established as one of the staples of contemporary music for choirs. Chilcott composed his settings of *Aesop's Fables* in 2008. He uses the nineteenth century translations of the original Greek by the Reverend George Fyler Townsend, setting five of the over six hundred fables apparently written by Aesop. Each movement starts with its title and ends with the moral of the tale spoken by the choir. The choral writing, while challenging, is tuneful and harmonically attractive.

The Geographical Fugue by Ernst Toch is best known for being a purely spoken piece. Surprisingly (!), the text is built upon the names of a number of (largely "exotic") locations, ranging from Trinidad (at the opening and close) including Mexico, Mississippi, Yokohama and more. It being a fugue, each part (in order: tenor, alto, soprano and bass) states the "theme" – *Trinidad! and the big Mississippi, and the town Honolulu and the Lake Titicaca* – before it is then taken up by the next part and so on. The theme is then truncated, given new rhythm, halved in speed, and similar, before the whole choir launches the most enormous crescendo leading to a final *TRINIDAD!* 

Colin Baines has been a major character in the musical life of Birmingham over the past fifty years. He's a singer, a composer, a conductor and a pianist and has held posts with organisations including the CBSO Chorus, The City of Birmingham Choir and, most notably, the Birmingham Choral Union, of which he has been conductor for almost forty-five years. Alongside all this, Colin has been Music Director of a youth drama festival, held in and around St David's in Pembrokeshire each summer since 1969, where around thirty-five young people (supported by a number of adults) put on a series of performances of open-air Shakespeare, poetry and prose evenings and family shows over a two-and-a -half week period - with no evenings off! In addition to over one hundred and fifty Shakespeare settings (three of which we performed last May) Colin, with his wife Jenny Baines and his sister-in-law Julie Beckett, have created over a dozen enchanting family shows, each containing several musical numbers. One such is the Baines/Beckett/Baines version of *Alice in Wonderland*. Colin wrote nine songs for the show (and asked me to tackle *Jabberwocky*) which we will perform in the second half of tonight's concert. The opening song (Down the Rabbit Hole) and *Finale* are settings of words by Jenny Baines which respectively act as bookends to the Alice story.

#### **MUSIC DIRECTOR: Michael Turner**

From Birmingham, Michael Turner studied violin and viola, before settling on percussion as his main instrumental study. As a singer, he has been a member of the CBSO Chorus, along with a number of other choirs across the Midlands.

Michael has attended conducting courses with John Carewe and George Hurst and studied under Hilary Davan Wetton, with whom he settled on adopting the conducting technique favoured by Sir Adrian Boult.

A music graduate of Leicester University, Michael has conducted several amateur and professional ensembles and choirs including the Birmingham Singers, Proteus Chamber Orchestra, the More Singers, the Telford Orchestra, the Marches Choir and the Phoenix Singers. He made his professional debut with the Milton Keynes City Orchestra and has also worked with the Manchester Camerata. Michael has been Music Director of the Bloomsbury Chamber Orchestra since 1996, was Music Director of the Oswestry Sinfonia from 2014 - 2020 and became Music Director of the Stretton Choral Society in September 2021. He has been an ensemble conductor for Shropshire Music Service since 2016.

Michael has composed extensively, with works including a Horn Concerto, several orchestral and choral works, instrumental music and pieces for percussion and wind ensemble. He lives in South Shropshire with his wife. They have three sons, with one boy a former Cathedral chorister.

#### PIANIST and ACCOMPANIST: Gill Styles

Gill was born in West Yorkshire. She studied music at Goldsmiths' College, London where she focused on piano and voice. For over thirty years she has been a juniorschool class teacher with responsibility for music. Throughout her career she has enjoyed accompanying singers and instrumentalists, as well as playing chamber music, performing as a vocal soloist and singing in local choirs.

Do you like the idea of singing in a choir? But perhaps you are put off because you've never had any formal choir training, or because you think all the music will be unfamiliar?


#### Don't worry!
