Stretton Choral Society is long-established as part of the musical landscape of the Strettons, open to all, friendly and welcoming, with no auditions, yet aiming for a high standard. Stretton Singers are the choir from Church Stretton

School, created by the Head of Music, Andrea Chapman.



Tonight is a new venture where the town and school come together to make music at Christmas. As is our tradition, Stretton Choral Society perform excerpts from a major work, this year, Bach's Christmas Oratorio, and a selection of carols. We have readings, audience carols, and musical interludes. But we also have performances from Stretton Singers, who sing in the second half, before a soloist from the school joins the Choral Society to perform Howard Goodall's Psalm 23 (better known as the Vicar of Dibley theme!)

The soloist was chosen through a competition sponsored by Stretton Choral Society. A dozen students sang a piece of their choice to a judging panel from the Choral Society. Three winners, as well as receiving a cash prize, then performed the Goodall solo in a second round. The overall winner, Isabelle Clews from Year 9, is our soloist tonight. Congratulations!

Through the competition and joint concert tonight, we aim both to introduce more young people to choral singing, and to promote community links between town and school. This (along with singing in local residential homes) is funded by the proceeds of our Quiz Night earlier this year – do support next year's Quiz Night to enable these community initiatives to continue!

And do consider joining us to sing. Choral singing (at least how we do it) is fun and uplifting, and we'd love more people to experience that. We can't emphasise enough that all are welcome; no previous experience necessary!

Stretton Choral Society Spring Term 2026

In a new departure, rather than decide our programme in advance, we are making the first rehearsal, Thursday 15 January, a Come and Sing fun evening open to everyone, where we will try out a few pieces and collectively decide what we want to perform for the concert. Tea and cake included – do join us!

Some brief thoughts on tonight's programme

from our Music Director, Michael Turner

This evening's concert falls very much into two halves. In a similar way to how we approached Handel's *Messiah* in 2024, I have selected a series of chorales and two choruses from J S

Bach's *Christmas Oratorio* to form the first half of this evening's programme. As before, I've inserted three instrumental carol arrangements between the numbers, by way of contrast.

The Christmas Oratorio is a six-part work, each part corresponding to a key day in the Christmas season, telling the story of Jesus'

birth, the angels' announcement to the shepherds. their adoration. the naming, the Magi's journey, and their final adoration. The Oratorio consists of recitatives, arias, choruses, and chorales (hymns) to guide the listener through the Nativity narrative from Christmas Day through to Epiphany and Bach incorporates music from earlier compositions within it. While it was written for the Christmas season of 1734, remarkably, it wasn't until 17 December 1857 that the complete public performance took place.

The second half of our concert is given over to the usual mix of carols, readings and other items. Traditional carols top and tail the programme, for which we would welcome some lusty singing from you, the audience! Within the music that is sandwiched in between, it's great that we have been able to incorporate such a spread of different musical styles. I'll highlight

two pieces in particular. John Joubert's Torches has become a classic of 20th Century carol repertoire. Its straightforward melody and distinctly different verses at once gentle, then almost pagan – call us to the place of Christ's birth with earthy enthusiasm. By way of Lilv Allen's contrast. Somewhere Only We Know, offers us an escape from the

hustle and bustle of modern life, striving for a simpler existence away from mobile phones, social media and the seemingly constant barrage of grim news that we all live with.

Our two readings give an alternative look at elements of the Christmas season while, aside of carols, we have an instrumental arrangement of *Jingle Bells* (as I explained to someone recently, most definitely not a carol!) which is invaded by eight other pieces of Christmas music. See if you can spot them.

We're delighted to have you with us at our concert. Let me take this opportunity to wish you a very Happy Christmas and a prosperous New Year from all of this evening's performers.

MUSIC DIRECTOR, STRETTON CHORAL SOCIETY and STRETTON HILLS ENSEMBLE: Michael Turner

From Birmingham, Michael Turner studied violin and viola, before settling on percussion as his main instrumental study. As a singer, he has been a member of the CBSO Chorus, along with a number of other choirs across the Midlands.

Michael has attended conducting courses with John Carewe and George Hurst and studied under Hilary Davan Wetton, with whom he settled on adopting the conducting technique favoured by Sir Adrian Boult.

A music graduate of Leicester University, Michael has conducted several amateur and professional ensembles and choirs including the Birmingham Singers, Proteus Chamber Orchestra, the More Singers, the Telford Orchestra, the Marches Choir and the Phoenix Singers. He made his professional debut with the Milton Keynes City Orchestra and has also worked with the Manchester Camerata. Michael has been Music Director of the Bloomsbury Chamber Orchestra since 1996, was Music Director of the Oswestry Sinfonia from 2014 - 2020 and became Music Director of the Stretton Choral Society in September 2021. He has been an ensemble conductor for Shropshire Music Service since 2016.

Michael has composed extensively, with works including a Horn Concerto, several orchestral and choral works, instrumental music and pieces for percussion and wind ensemble. He lives in South Shropshire with his wife, who is also a musician. Perhaps inevitably, they have three musical sons!

HEAD OF MUSIC, CHURCH STRETTON SCHOOL: Andrea Chapman

Andrea is a graduate of Viola Performance from Birmingham Conservatoire and has performed in a many orchestras and string quartets in the Midlands She has toured with Mid Wales Opera and was also musical director of Lapal Community Choir in Halesowen. She arrived in Church Stretton during the summer of 2023 to take up the post of Music Teacher at Church Stretton School, having been Head of Music at a secondary school in Dudley for over 20 years. She plays with the Accordion Band, sings with the Choral Society and church choir and plays viola with a local folk band.

PIANIST and ACCOMPANIST: Gill Styles

Gill was born in West Yorkshire. She studied music at Goldsmiths' College, London where she focused on piano and voice. For over thirty years she has been a junior-school class teacher with responsibility for music. Throughout her career she has enjoyed accompanying singers and instrumentalists, as well as playing chamber music, performing as a vocal soloist and singing in local choirs.
